From the Pastor's Pen

Obscure saint of the week: St. Bruno of Wurzburg (May 27) was the son of Duke Conrad of Carinthia and the Baroness Matilda. He was also the nephew of Pope Gregory V, and the cousin to emperor Conrad II, and later a counselor to him. Bruno was the great-nephew of Saint Bruno of Querfort. Bruno was younger than average when ordained. Later he became the bishop of Würzburg, Germany in 1033. He built the Cathedral of Saint Killian with his personal funds, and several parish churches in his diocese. He was a noted scholar and author, his best-known work being a commentary on the Psalms. Bruno was also known as a peacemaker who ended the siege of Milan, Italy. He joined emperor Henry III on the campaign against the Hungarians and earned the popular title of Father of the poor through his charity.





Obscure saint of the week: St. Secundus of Troia (May 27) immigrated to Italy from north Africa to escape persecution by Arian Vandals in the 3rd century. He became the bishop of Troia, Italy.

Holiness is not something we acquire by avoiding evil; we avoid evil because we are holy.


Holiness is not something that follows from prayer; we pray because we are holy.

Where was the first Marian apparition?

Did you know that the first Marian apparition occurred even before the Blessed Mother was assumed into Heaven?



Around 40 A.D., Many is believed to have appeared to the Apostle James the Greater in modern-day Zaragoza, Spain. The Blessed Mother was standing on a pillar of jasper, helped by two angels, an apparition that led to the devotion to Our Lady of the Pillar.

According to tradition, at the time, St. James was evangelizing to the Romans in modern-day Spain and was encountering great struggles and discouragement. While he was praying by a river, Mary bilocated from Jerusalem to bring St. James encouragement and consolation.

Today, the Cathedral-Basilica of Our Lady of the Pillar is located at the site of the apparition in Zaragoza, Spain. This cathedral was the first church dedicated to Mary in Church history.

The basilica contains majestic artwork; the main attraction is the wooden statue of Our Lady, standing on a jasper column. Many well-known Church figures and leaders have visited the Cathedral-Basilica of Our Lady of the Pillar, including St. Teresa of Ávila, St. John of the Cross, and St. Ignatius of Loyola.

May is the month of Mary! Let these last days of May remind you to grow in devotion to our Blessed Mother. The saints understood the importance of Mary's role in our spiritual lives. Studying the saints' own devotion to Our Lady is a powerful way to grow in your own devotion! In <u>How They Love Mary</u>, you will learn about the unique relationship between Our Lady and 28 saints and about the lessons you can learn from their devotion!



Questions Catholics Ask What's an evangelist? How many are there?

By the time of the third-century church fathers, the list of evangelists seems reduced down to four: the gospel writers Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.

Evangelist translates from the Greek as "messenger of good tidings." All baptized persons are called to be such messengers. From the professional preacher to the person who exemplifies a life of Christian virtue, all might validly claim to be evangelists. As early as Isaiah's prophecies, heralds of good news are cited in the Bible. In the Letter to the Ephesians, apostles, prophets, and evangelists play vital roles within the church. The deacon Philip in Acts is called an evangelist, as is Paul's protege Timothy. So it's clear that in biblical terms, evangelist is not an exclusive term.

However, by the time of the third-century church fathers, the list of evangelists seems reduced down to four: the gospel writers Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. These four concretized the Good News which the whole church going forward would proclaim. In early church art, the four evangelists were simply depicted as men holding books, or symbolically as four scrolls situated at the corners of a cross. They were also imagined as the four rivers of Paradise mentioned in Genesis: Pishon, Gihon, Tigris, and Euphrates, meant to water the earth and give it life. By the fourth century, the symbology of the gospel evangelists became a standardized tetramorph ("four shapes"): man, lion, ox, and eagle. These were not arbitrarily chosen. In the initial vision of the prophet Ezekiel, he perceives "a great stormwind" blowing in from the North. Riding this gale are four living creatures. They appear in human form with faces, legs, and hands. But they also have wings and polished hooves. Facing outwardly in the four directions, their faces resemble a human, lion, ox, and eagle respectively. "Wherever the spirit would go, they went; they did not change direction when they moved." These extraordinary creatures are four and yet unified in their movement. They also burn like coals of fire.

This tetramorph makes a reappearance in the Book of Revelation, and it's likely that the writer, John of Patmos, consciously intends the gospel writers with this usage. Matthew emphasizes the humanity of Jesus: he's represented as the man. Mark highlights the divinity and kingship of Jesus, and is identified as the lion. Luke holds up the sacrificial character of Jesus and so becomes the ox. John is the eagle. His gospel soars above the others with its transcendent perspective on the meaning of Jesus as the eternal Christ.

We pray that You welcome these men and women into Your loving and merciful heart. We also pray that those enduring these struggles right now realize that suicide is not the answer. May they find the hope they are looking for because there are good people out there who are willing and able to help them.

We pray also for those designated POW/MIA. Their families have no closure. They don't know if their loved ones are alive or dead. Bring them the answers they seek and, if possible, bring the missing home.

Finally, comfort the families of all the men and women who have been lost to war and terrorism. To them, the deceased are not just military personnel, but rather father, mother, husband, wife, son, daughter, friend. Help these families remember the good times and look forward to being reunited with their loved ones in Your heavenly kingdom some day where there will be no more mourning.

We ask this in Your loving name, Father.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

Dt 4:32-34, 39-40 | Rom 8:14-17 | Mt 28:16-20

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today is an opportunity to reflect on and celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity: One God, two natures (Jesus is fully human and fully divine), and three divine persons. Whenever I think about this feast, I am reminded of some wise words I heard once from a professor, although I am paraphrasing: It's not necessary to try to describe in theological terms what God is, for no matter what we say it will be inadequate to the reality of the ultimate grandeur of God. What is important, and what affects people day to day. is talking about who God is, and how God is. And so this Trinity Sunday is a day to reiterate that which is most fundamental to our understanding and belief: God is love. Not just God is loving, or God loves, but God is love itself. He is a continual outpouring of selfless love - agape is the Greek word - which brought forth creation, and all creatures to share in it. It is a communion of love by which and for which we were created; we are meant to emulate and live that same relational communion of love with one another.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As human beings, we simply do not have the ability to live our baptismal call perfectly – to love one another as God loves us. What we do have is our Triune God who gives us the grace to strive for perfection as in Christ, but who, in the end, is the one who perfects us in him. "[We] must keep his statutes and commandments," Moses has said. And Paul gives us hope in doing so as he tells us that "The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God." The Lord is here with us, helping us and advocating for us. And in our mission of discipleship, we have the promise from Jesus, "Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." We give thanks and praise to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit for all these gifts and so much more.

PRAY All Christian prayer is Trinitarian in nature: we pray to the Father, through the Son, in/by the power of the Spirit. Some prayers are very specifically written to include the Trinity/Godhead by name. The most recognizable one is this doxology, or the Glory Be: Glory Be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Add it to your daily prayers.



The Most Holy Trinity

May 26, 2024: Dt 4:32-34,39-40 | Ps 33:4-6,9,12b,18-20,22 | Rom 8:14-17 | Mt 28:16-20

Pray: Heavenly Father, thank you for loving and guiding me through the Holy Trinity. Amen.

The Holy Trinity is a reminder to make loving, faith-sharing relationships.

Our Universal Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Trinity today. The Risen Christ's Great Commission to his disciples then and now commands: "Make disciples of all nations." We are comforted and inspired by Jesus' promise to always be with us, as this assignment is challenging!

Central to the Christian faith is belief in the one, true, Triune God, the Blessed Trinity — the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. This supernatural mystery of three persons in one God is a doctrine of our faith, first developed from Sacred Scripture and communal prayer of the early church and officially affirmed by the close of the fourth century. Through the Trinity's mystery, power, and love, God the Father stays in intimate communion with everyone baptized through Jesus the Son and the Holy Spirit.

Our God is generous, loving, and merciful. Having made us in His image. He seeks to draw us to Himself and make us more like Him each day in love and service to others. He supports and directs us through the mutual love shared by His Son and the love of the Holy Spirit. We can count on all three persons of the one true God in the Holy Trinity to help us in our relationships, face the world's challenges, reach our goal of heaven, and bring others to Christ's saving grace.

As Life-giver, God the Father is our Creator, authority, and powerful protector. His infinite and unconditional love directs our lives toward His perfect and holy will, always for the good of our soul and the good and salvation of humanity.

Jesus, the Son of God, is God the Father's gift to us to reveal Himself in the flesh. What we see and learn through Christ's life and teachings mirrors

> the love of God the Father. Jesus glorifies the Father, and He is the only way to eternal life with the Father.

> The Holy Spirit is the divine Advocate promised by Jesus to come to dwell in us. By the Spirit, the Father and the Son live within us, enlightening our understanding and paths to

holiness, filling us with the gift of faith, and transforming our hearts and lives.

The Holy Trinity's example teaches us the value of relationships. Jesus, with the gifts and graces of the Holy Spirit, asks us to spread the Good News of God's love through our love and faith in action and our words of hope, truth, mercy, and peace.
