

From the Pastor's Pen

Obscure saint of the week: .**St. Agrippina of Rome (June 23)** was born to the imperial Roman nobility. She became a consecrated virgin, the closest thing at that time to a nun. She was tortured and martyred during the persecutions of Valerian.





Obscure saint of the week: St. Etheldreda was the sister of Saint Jurmin and

relative of King Anna of East Anglia, England. She was a princess and later widowed after three years marriage; rumor had it that the marriage was never consummated as Etheldrda had taken a vow of perpetual virginity. She married again for political reasons. Her new husband knew of her vow, but grew tired of living as brother and sister and began to make advances on her; she refused him. He tried to bribe the local bishop, Saint Wilfrid of York, to release her from her vow; Wilfrid refused, and instead helped Audrey escape to a promontory called Colbert's Head. A high tide then came in – and stayed high for seven days; it kept her separated from her husband and was considered divine intervention. The young man gave up; the marriage was annulled, and Audrey took the veil. She spent a year with her niece, Saint Ebbe the

Elder. She founded the great abbey of Ely, where she lived an austere life.

Etheldreda died of an enormous and unsightly tumor on her neck. She gratefully accepted this as Divine retribution for all the neck-laces she had worn in her early years.


In the Middle Ages, a festival called Saint Audrey's Fair, was held at Ely on her feast day. The exceptional shoddiness of the merchandise, especially the neckerchiefs, contributed to the English language the word tawdry, a corruption of Saint Audrey.

The Sunday Gospel in Everyday English

Late that day he said to them, "Let's go across to the other side." They took him in the boat as he was. Other boats came along. A huge storm came up. Catholic Snacks, Get Fed

Where is the earliest depiction of Our Lady? This treasure is hidden away deep in the catacombs

In the midst of heavy persecution, early Christians risked death to paint the earliest known image of Our Lady.

High on the walls of the Priscilla Catacombs in Rome, a beautiful yet faded fresco depicts the Virgin Mary tenderly nursing the Child Jesus. In contrast to the harsh realities of their persecution, the compassionate gaze of Our Lady, filled with maternal love, offered hope and solace to those enduring such trials. It is no wonder these members of the early Church risked so much to paint our comforting Blessed Mother.

Even the symbolism within this depiction of Our Lady brought peace to her afflicted viewers. She is portrayed in clothes that would have been familiar to the persecuted Romans, making her an even more maternal figure. She wears a woolen garment typical of Roman matrons and a short veil worn by dedicated

Beside her stands a man in a heavy cloak, pointing towards the Star of Bethlehem. Some scholars argue that this is the prophet Isaiah, who foretold: "The Lord Himself shall give you a sign. Behold, a Virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and his name shall be called Emmanuel." However, this is not entirely agreed upon and other scholars suggest the man is the prophet Balaam, who prophesied: "A star shall come forth out of Jacob, and a scepter shall rise out of Israel."

The figures are shaded by a tree branch that stretches out above them, likely alluding to the Old Testament prophecy: "There shall come forth a Rod from the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots."

Questions Catholics Ask "What Is Grace?"

A big question to address in a small space! The simple definition of grace is *God's favor*. But what it means to receive such benevolence is demonstrated in boundless ways. As a child in religion class, I remember imagining grace as a birthday present in a brightly wrapped box with a big bow on top. That's because Sister told us grace is a gift, and the only gifts I'd ever seen looked like this.

The Old Testament describes God's favor differently. It's expressed in the act of creation, as well as the covenant with Israel, and the liberating force of Exodus. In the New Testament, Saint Paul rightly calls Jesus Christ the grace of God, using the Greek word *charis*, from which also comes *charisma*, the empowering gifts of the Spirit.

So how do we "get" grace, or know it when we see it operating? Divine grace comes to us through the mercy, forgiveness, and rescue of God at work in our lives. The classic definition of a sacrament is that of a sign rooted in Christ which provides grace. So add the sacraments of the Church to the ways in which we receive this gift. The Eastern Fathers went so far as to say that sacraments "divinize" us: God becomes flesh so that flesh can share in the divine life, including God's immortality.

In the West, Saint Augustine argued that grace heals and liberates our sin-inclined wills so that we can do the will of God. Without grace, we're literally lost. Saint Thomas Aquinas envisioned grace as elevating us to a higher level in closer union with God. Thomas Merton saw grace as the antidote to the "death dance" in our blood. The bottom line on all of these approaches to understanding grace—life-giving force, bonded relationship, liberating power, incarnation and participation in divine gifts, healing, uplifting, unifying, detoxifying—is that it comes to us free and unmerited. We can't earn it by obeying laws or racking up spiritual points. God doesn't "owe" us grace even if we're saintly every moment of the day. In a sense, my childhood notion of grace still applies. Like any present offered in love and presented in grand style, grace comes to us free of charge.

But just like any gift that comes in a pretty package, grace is hardly received if we don't open the box and actually make use of it.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


St. Boniface, an English Benedictine monk who died in the 8th century, wrote in a letter: "In her voyage across the ocean of this world. the Church is like a great ship being pounded by the waves of life's different stresses. Our duty is not to abandon ship but to keep her on her course." Oceans and seas, lakes and rivers, baptism. The role of water in daily life and its use as a metaphor are woven throughout our Scriptures. In today's readings, we hear two references to the sea. First, we have God talking to Job out of a storm, reminding the prophet that he - the Lord - is the one who created the seas and keeps them firmly in their place. The Gospel passage provides us with a stark reminder of that truth. As the disciples and Jesus cross the sea, a storm crops up and threatens to sink their boat. But one command from Jesus and the water is still. St. Boniface had it right. We really all are on that ship with Jesus on its voyage across the ocean of this world, and trusting in him to keep us on course and safe from harm ensures we reach the destinations he intends for us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How to do our part to keep this great ship that is the Church on course? Trust in Christ, trust that he is present within us and guiding us each day. No one is immune from stormy seas, and like the disciples, we can turn to Jesus in times of peril. He asked the disciples: "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" Like the disciples, we must experience the change of heart that is necessary to place complete trust in Jesus to replace our fear and anxiety. God has things under control. Of course, that is what can be so scary sometimes. I know God will take care of everything, but what if I don't like how he does it? What if I want him to answer my prayers one way and he answers them a different way? This is where Jesus might ask me: "Do you not yet have faith?" And I would have to reply, "I'm working on it."

PRAY We are assured throughout Scripture that God loves us, cares for us, and sustains us. But how do we move from knowing that in our heads to feeling it in our hearts? Prayer. If we center our life on Jesus and his commands, trusting in him will become second nature. Take some time this week and pray with today's Psalm (107:23-24, 25-26, 28-29, 30-31), which praises God for his love for us and gives voice to trusting in his providence.

Prepare for the Storms in Our Lives

Springtime weather is unpredictable dangerous in Tornado Alley, the Midwestern region of the United States. Destructive, violent winds and funnel-shaped clouds can wreak havoc communities. During storm season. meteorologists do their best to watch and warn everyone when conditions look volatile so they can heed warnings, take appropriate shelter, and be prepared. Meteorologists carefully observe conditions. atmospheric windspeeds, supercell thunderstorm circulation, but there is usually a lot of uncertainty about when, where, and if a "terrible twister" is coming. Sometimes, disaster is unavoidable even when people are prepared, and good people become victims of tragedy.

Life often throws unexpected storms our way. When we think everything is under control, we might face a sudden health scare, a job loss, a relationship crisis, or the heart-wrenching loss of a loved one. Then what?

We can weather storms by building shelters for spiritual support and peace before bad things happen. We can acknowledge our need for God the Father who made and loves us. We can develop and nurture a personal relationship with Jesus, our Lord and Savior, through study, prayer, participation in Mass, and receiving the sacraments. We can prepare by surrendering our hearts to the Holy Spirit, who is with us to guide

and protect us against the evil snares of the devil. We can prepare our hearts to rely on God and to accept the things we cannot change with grace and peace, knowing that Christ keeps His promises to be with us always, even in the storms of life.



It is helpful to remember that the storms we face often draw us closer to God and teach us to rely on Him fully. When we suffer through storms, our reliance on divine help builds our hope and trust in Him, the "Father Almighty," whom we affirm in our

Profession of Faith at Mass. This journey of faith and resilience allows us to share our experiences with others who need help. Mark's Gospel reminds us not to be afraid and to be patient. As children of God, we are heirs of His grace and He promises to be with us always.

- † How are you nurturing your shelter in Christ ahead of possible storms?
- † How have you waited for God's help during a storm, and what helped you be patient?
- † How have you shared the peace of Christ with others who are going through a storm?
- † If God is Almighty and loves us, why do "storms" – bad things – still happen to good people?
- † How does Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection bring hope in life's storms? How does the Holy Spirit help in difficult situations?
